Welcome to the Term One Bulletin

A new year always bring new ideas and perspectives, and 2021 has not been any different. This year we have already welcomed seven new staff members into the school, including teachers, a new learning Support Coordinator and a new Youth Guidance Counsellor. We are excited to see the impact these new staff are already having on the school and look forward to the future benefits they can bring to the College.

The year also started off with the fantastic news around our NCEA achievement. Once again, our Level 1, 2 and 3 results have been above National averages, with our Level 3 results jumping up to a 93% pass rate which is an amazing achievement for the College and testament to the hard work and dedication shown by staff and students alike.

We also saw a huge increase in the number of students attaining their University Entrance (UE) requirements. Over 45% of all Year 13 leavers, left this year with UE and we wish them all well with their future in whatever career path they have chosen.

Unlike 2020, we have managed to get through the first term relatively unaffected by COVID19 and we have been able to successfully run all our sporting activities which we normally hold within the first term. The Swimming Sports, Athletics and Cross Country were all extremely successful events, with several long-standing records being broken.

In addition, many of our young athletes have gone on to represent the College on a regional stage, and some will continue onto National events. As a small rural College, we continue to hit well above our weight when it comes to sporting achievement and I would like to congratulate all competitors who participated in these events. Regardless of winning or losing, the team spirit and camaraderie which was evident during these events, was a

joy to see and is a good illustration of the school values of Respect, Involvement and Excellence.

As we now move forward with the rest of the year, our focus turns once again to the academic achievement and attainment of our students. Tracking of all year groups is now well underway and we will be reporting on their progress over the next few weeks.

This year we have decided to try a different approach to parent/whānau engagement and are trialling some drop-in sessions at Woodville Primary School and Eketahuna Primary School. I would encourage any Primary School parent living in the Tararua District to visit these sessions to hear about the College, meet some of the staff and ask any questions they may have. This will just be the first opportunity to hear about the college as we have other events planned throughout the rest of the year.

Secondly, we have scheduled a Check In day in May for all College students' parents and whānau. Rather than cram this into an already busy end of term, we decided to push this out to the start of Term Two. Once again, I encourage all parents/whānau to make appointments to come and speak to the teachers. However, we are also opening this up beyond the face-to-face appointments. Following on from the restrictions last year, we now recognise that some caregivers prefer to discuss their child's progress remotely and so we are extending the options to include telephone or Zoom conversations. Look out for the information regarding this coming out soon. So, as we now move into the end of term break, I would like to pass on my thanks for the continued support we receive from our whole community and look forward to a very successful and productive year ahead. 

## TC Chat Community Feedback – Board Survey December 2020

Consultation with our community forms a very important part of self-review and strengthens relationships to achieve the best outcomes for our students.

Key points and next steps are summarised below:

#### Level of Satisfaction

Families are generally well satisfied with the experiences their children have at Tararua College. They identify that teachers have the key positive impact on their child with the level of care, support, and relationships. Although, a few find disruptions like noisy classrooms and social interactions can detract from that experience.

#### **Connection with Community**

Connection with the community is vital for Tararua College as the school is seen as a particularly important part of the town. A deliberate effort has been made to raise the profile of the school.

The community feel the connection with the college is strongest with parents and other schools and not so strong with local government and the Māori community. Facebook is seen as the strongest way to communicate followed by the Bush Telegraph and attending functions.

The community acknowledges what Tararua College does well:

- Support for students
- Inclusiveness
- Above average educational achievement
- An attractive and safe environment
- Has high expectations of students.
- Cultural responsiveness

And the areas for improvement:

- Cultural events
- Use of social media.
- Opportunities for parents to come together.
