Yet another tough term comes to an end. Having got through the last two years, we were all hoping that 2022 would allow us to get back to a more normal life, and then of course Omicron hit us.

From day one, the restrictions we were put under affected what we have been able to do. Even though we have managed to run a lot of our events and activities, we have been unable to share these with friends and whanau. The restrictions limited our year 9 pōwhiri to just the students and a small number of staff. This year's Athletics were curtailed to a single day with no visitors and the Swimming Sports was only for competitors and had to be held down at the town pool.

Absences of both students and staff have led us to implement a hybrid model of learning where students were being taught both in school and at home. Most of our students have coped well with this arrangement and it is hoped that this has not affected their learning to any great extent.

The lifting of the mandates and the easing of restrictions has given us hope that things will get better. Having reached our lowest attendance rate in the 40% at the peak of the infection, we have now returned to nearly preomicron levels and are hopeful that we are now over the worst.

While the threat of more Omicron infections still hangs over us, ensuring that we try and function as normally as possible in Term 2 will be our primary goal. We continue to plan for a full Term of events, and I hope that we can run all the events and activities in the Calendar.

The next two weeks break will allow us all to rest and recuperate from what has been a long and arduous start to the year. Take the time to check in with friends and family and show the aroha and manaakitanga that we all deserve.

Once again, by sticking together and working together we will all get through these times and come out the other end stronger and more determined than ever.

As ever, in a school environment, nothing ever stays the same for long. At the end of this week, we say farewell to a couple of staff members.

Miss Modrich is heading back home to Auckland to work at Kaipara College in Helensville. Miss Modrich has been a great addition to the English department over the past year. We will miss her but wish her well in her new role. Miss Modrich will be replaced by Miss Wadood later in Term 2.

Secondly, we say farewell to Mrs Hall, our Learning Support Coordinator. Susan is heading over to Australia to be with her family. Again, Susan has been a fantastic asset to the college, and we wish her all the best in her future. Susan's post has been filled by Monique Gunther, who brings huge experience of working with some of our most vulnerable children and young people.

Finally, at the end of Term 3 we will also be losing both Miss Madigan and Mr Cook. They have decided to take a break from teaching and go travelling around Europe and Asia. This will be an exciting time for them both but again a huge loss to the College.

In the meantime, I hope you all have a wonderful break and I look forward to seeing all our students return to on site learning in early May.

School Board Elections 2022

The triennial board elections will be held in September this year. The Ministry of Education now has an option for online voting using a cloud-based platform. You can read about how the online voting system will work on the My School Election website.

What are school boards?

All New Zealand's state and state-integrated schools have a school board which is the Crown entity responsible for the governance of the school.

The board:

- ensures every student can reach their highest possible standard in student achievement
- is the employer of all staff in the school
- sets the school's strategic direction in consultation with parents, whānau, staff, students, and the wider school community
- is responsible for overseeing the management of personnel, curriculum, property, finance, and administration

Board membership


There are three types of representative members who are elected to the board. These "representative" board members are elected by the parent community, staff members and, in the case of schools with students above Year 9, the students.

There are also other types of board members, including the principal, co-opted and appointed board members.

A standard school board's membership includes:

- <u>parent elected (or selected) representatives</u> (usually five)
- the principal of the school
- one <u>staff-elected representative</u>
- one student-elected representative (in schools with students above Year 9)
- state integrated schools: four board members appointed by the proprietor

The board can co-opt additional people onto the board for gender, skill or ethnic balance, and the Minister of Education can appoint an additional board member.



Becoming a Board Member

Why join a school board?

School board members are active leaders in our schools. They have an important role of supporting strong professional leadership and ensuring effective teaching for all students through informed governance.

Parents/caregivers and people in the wider community can be parent representatives. School boards need to represent the diversity of their school communities to ensure a bright future for all our children.

The school board elections are the opportunity to vote for candidates who will make a positive difference for children's education. We need more people willing to use their skills and experiences for the benefit of students!

What sort of skills do board members need?

Every board member brings their own unique set of skills and experiences to the board.

As a member of your school's board, you will need to work well in a team and have good communication skills. It can help to have an understanding of the education sector. You may have financial skills and experience in managing people, knowledge and understanding of communities within your school, or experience working within your school and wider communities.

Every school board member can access NZSTA online professional development to learn about governance and upskill in areas of interest.

Kōrari is a set of introduction courses that provide an overview of school governance for people who've never been on a school board.

How do I become a board member?

Contact Michelle Rankin for information about the school board and upcoming elections. Ask the board chair, Louise Powick, about going along to a board meeting to see how it works. Take the opportunity to ask the board members questions about their role and the board's work at Tararua College.

Cricket Success For Year 11 Student Thomas Inder

It has been a busy holiday period for Thomas this summer. He was selected for the Manawatu U15's cricket squad for three or four games of cricket prior to January with the squad being whittled down to a final XI at the end of December. Thomas was then selected in the final U15's Manawatu XI to play at the Central Districts men's U15 Tournament on the 17th of January. He was made Vice Captain of this team, a well-earned role.

Before the Central District tournament Thomas was invited to play in a men's match from the Burnside West Christchurch University Cricket Club while on holiday in Christchurch. He played alongside his older brother James. Thomas left a positive impression on the team and club after bowling extremely well with outstanding figures of 4 overs, 1 maiden, 4 runs, and taking 3 wickets. During this match Thomas also took a catch (from his brothers bowling) and got a run out as well.

He was commended on his attitude and maturity from the team and received player of the day at the Club afterwards.

On returning home Thomas helped the U15 team win two T20 warm up matches against Hutt Academy prior to the CD tournament.

The Central District tournament saw Manawatu play against U15 sides from Hawkes Bay, Taranaki, Whanganui, Wairarapa, Nelson, and Marlborough.

Over the week the teams played four T20 matches and two 50 over matches. This tournament is the first exposure to Central District coaches and selectors and the tournament itself creates lifelong friendships from players throughout the district. There was some very high-quality cricket played from young men who may move to higher honours as their cricket careers progress.

Thomas was able to use his knowledge and skill at the tournament for his team. In a game against Whanganui, he scored 78 runs off 43 balls with 9 fours and 2 sixes. Then in the field he took two catches and got a runout. When Feilding during the Marlborough game Thomas took three wickets bowling. Overall, Thomas had a good tournament and helped his team get third place in the district. Thomas received two certificates from the tournament boss, The first for scoring 50 or more runs in a game and the second was for taking 3 wickets in a match.

With the completion of the tournament this concluded matches for the Manawatu U15's team 2021/2022 season. The team will be split for matches for boys aged U16 and U14.

Since returning from the CD U15 camp Thomas has been asked to play for the Dannevirke Senior Men's P1's team through his club cricket. He is really benefiting from his experiences over summer, including earlier scoring his first "tonne", as they call it, for the Dannevirke Men's P3 Yellow team. He scored 101 not out when the team faced the other Dannevirke Men's P3 team. It took guts to stay in and keep scoring while all the other members of your team got out.

Thomas is looking forward to playing for Tararua College first XI again this year.




SSC News

Access to Period Products in Schools.

The Ministry of Education has launched its 'Access to Period Products' initiative. We have our first order of free period products at school now. We have enough to distribute two packs per student, per month. The products we have are super tampons, regular tampons, super pads, and regular pads. Students can choose their products when they come to collect. Period products are available for students to collect at any time from Millie Frank and Dionne Brown at the Nurses' Office, Ms Arends at the PE Office, Mrs Richards at the Library Office, Ms Doidge, and Ms West at the Deans' Office and from Ms Sheridan at the Deputy Principal's Office. More information about the initiative from the Ministry of Education: 'The access to period products initiative aims to provide free period products to children and young people in all state and state-integrated schools and Kura across New Zealand during 2021. Periods are a fact of life for half the population. Despite this, young people do not always have access to the products they need to feel comfortable at school, engage in their learning, and manage what should be a normal and healthy part of life. Poor access to period products can affect students' attendance and engagement at school. Students also miss out on sporting and cultural activities and can feel embarrassed and ashamed about not being supported to manage their periods. This affects their achievement and wellbeing. Findings from the Youth 19 Survey found 12 per cent of year 9 to 13 students who menstruate reported difficulty getting access to products due to cost; and recent research from the University of Otago found that 94,788 girls aged 9 to 18 from the country's poorest households may be unable to afford to buy period products and could be missing school when they have their period. Providing access to free period products to those who need it in all state and state-integrated schools and Kura will:

- reduce barriers to access and improve school attendance, sports involvement, and tertiary participation
- improve child and youth wellbeing
- reduce financial strain on families and whānau experiencing poverty/material hardship, and
- promote positive gender norms and reduce stigmatization of menstruation.
